Early Writing Book 1

Writing patterns made interesting to motivate the child to develop good motor control

A gradual introduction to lower-case letters with flicks leading out for the beginnings of joined-up handwriting

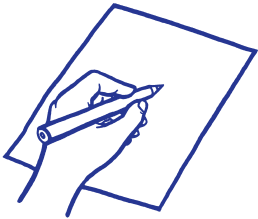
Early Writing Book 3

Hints for Good Handwriting

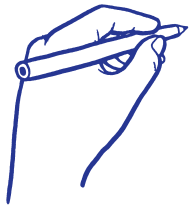
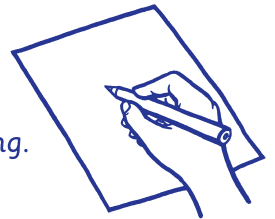


Always use a sharp pencil or a round-tipped pen.

A thick pencil is preferable when a child first starts to write.

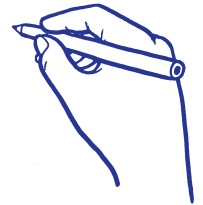
Sit comfortably with the writing paper at the correct angle for writing.

A right-handed child should have the paper tilted slightly to the left and a left-handed child should have the paper tilted slightly to the right.



Hold the pen or pencil correctly – the pencil should be held lightly by the thumb and forefinger. The middle finger supports the pencil underneath. The other two fingers rest on the table.

Do not press too hard on the paper.
