## Tricky spellings

## Remember

Some words have tricky spellings. The letter string 'ough' makes lots of different sounds. For example: bought ('aw') and bough ('ow'). The spelling rule of 'i before e' except after 'c' is used when the sound is 'ee'. For example: 'piece' or 'deceive'. Some words do not follow this rule and must be learnt instead.


