# Introduction

Non-verbal reasoning skills enable you to solve problems that do not involve words. These skills are useful for school tests, such as the 11+. 'Non-verbal' means that no words are used, so in non-verbal reasoning tests, pictures are used instead of words. Non-verbal reasoning skills are important in other aspects of life too because you make many decisions based on what you see. By practising your non-verbal reasoning skills you will learn to look and think more carefully, using **logic**.

# How to use this book

Before you start using this book, write your name in the box on the first page. Then decide how to begin. If you want a complete course on non-verbal reasoning, work right through the book. Another way to use the book is to dip into it when you want to find out about a particular type of question. The contents page or the index will help you to find the pages you need. Whichever way you choose, don't do too much at once – it's better to work in short bursts.

When you are ready to begin, find some scrap paper – or ask an adult for some. You may find this useful for your workings out. As you make a start, look out for these icons, which mark different parts of the text.
