Phrases and clauses

Explanation -Sentences are made up of words, phrases and clauses. A phrase is a group of words that go together. A noun phrase includes words that go with a noun. A **prepositional phrase** starts with a preposition, usually followed by a noun phrase. A **clause** is a special type of phrase – a group of words that includes a **verb**. Sentences are often made up of a clause and one or more additional phrases.
