

Adding suffixes: words ending –e

Explanation

Use these special rules when you add suffixes to words **ending –e**.

If the **suffix begins with a vowel** (a, e, i, o, u), you usually **drop the –e** before adding the suffix. It is called a **vowel suffix**. (For this rule, the **suffix y** also counts as a vowel suffix.)

Example nature + **al** → natural fame + **ous** → famous laze + **y** → lazy

If the **suffix begins with a consonant**, you **keep the –e** and add the suffix.

Example love + **ly** → lovely advertise + **ment** → advertisement

Activities

Did you know?

There are always some words that do not follow the rules. For example, **argue** ends **–e** but drops the **–e** when for a consonant suffix: argue + **ment** → argument.
