## Learning poems by heart

## Explanation

It can be fun to **learn a poem by heart** and then **recite** it. Pattern, rhythm and rhyme can help you remember a poem. When you recite a poem, try to say the words clearly and keep the rhythm and rhyme. If a poem is written in **rhyming couplets**, you might pause slightly at the end of lines to stress the rhyme.

The best way to learn a poem is to **read it again and again** until you can say it without looking at the words.
