Before reading

Tips for reading with children

- If your child pauses at a word, remind them to 'sound-talk the word' or to 'say the sounds' and then 'blend them together' [e.g., In the n-e-t net. In the net].
- Always prompt children to use their phonic knowledge and skills to decode words. Don't ask them to look for a clue in the picture, guess or rely on memory.
- Children might recognise some words automatically without sound-talking and blending them. This is a good thing, as it is a sign of reading fluency. They do not need to go back and sound-talk these words.
