## Glossary

blend	to say the separate sounds in a word and merge them together to read the whole word
digraph	two letters representing one sound (for example, 'ay')
grapheme	a letter or group of letters representing a <b>phoneme</b> or sound in a word
grapheme-phoneme correspondence (GPC	matching a <b>phoneme</b> to a <b>grapheme</b> , and vice versa
phoneme	the smallest unit of sound in speech
prefix	a part added to the beginning of a word to make a new word and change its meaning
root word	a basic word with no <b>prefix</b> or <b>suffix</b> added to it
segment	to break a word into separate sounds in order to spell it
sound button	a mark appearing below each letter, <b>digraph</b> or <b>trigraph</b> , which the child can touch as they say the sound
sound-talk	the process of saying, in the correct order, each separate sound in a word
suffix	a part added to the end of a word to make a new word and change its meaning
tricky word	a word that contains a letter or a group of letters that make an unusual or unfamiliar sound or a <b>grapheme</b> that the children do not yet know
trigraph	three letters representing one sound (for example, 'air')
unstressed	an <b>unstressed</b> vowel or syllable is one that does not make a clear sound. For example, the 'o' in the word 'crocodile' does not usually make a clear 'o' sound.
